**INVITATION FROM SOPEX**: Through Nancy Swan's efforts WE has been invited to hold a satellite meeting at SOPEX 2008 (Southern Oregon Philatelic Society's show and bourse), being held again at the Padgham Pavillion at EXPO in Central Point, OR. Dates are April 5 & 6, 10-5:30 and 10-4. It's an open show with prospectus available late this fall. They will be showing in 12 page frames. There will be 12-14 dealers. Nick Follansbee, show chair, is happy to welcome a WE satellite meeting, which will probably be around noon on April 6.

**INVITATION FROM COALPEX:** Through Vesma Grinfeld's efforts comes this info: COALPEX 2008, which will be held June 14 and 15 in Walnut Creek, California, is proud to host WE (Women Exhibitors), a growing group of philatelists with the goal of encouraging more women collectors to take up or improve their philatelic exhibiting. The exhibition will be restricted to women exhibitors who need not belong to WE. There are 50 frames available. In consideration of others who may wish to participate, it is suggested that exhibits be limited to 5 frames or less. Special awards are available for novice exhibitors and "brand new" exhibits. Previous WSP Gold Medal exhibits will be judged head-to-head in a "best of the best" competition; all others will compete for the usual five medal levels and other awards. # **THIS MONTH'S TOPIC**: What are your biggest problems in preparing an exhibit? Have you been able to overcome these problems? If not, WHY not? If you HAVE, HOW did you do it? Any advice to offer to others who may have the same problem(s)???

(**From Barb Harrison**) One of my big problems is trying to figure out how much information to include. In my limited experience, I've found that judges vary all over the place about just WHAT info you need to put in your exhibit. While one panel of judges may tell you that you've included too much information and that it is redundant (so after a few times you take some of it out!), the next panel may then tell you that you need to include more information in order to "demonstrate your philatelic knowledge." It makes me crazy!! So much in exhibiting is very subjective, and I just wish there were some absolutes. As long as there is so much opinion involved, there will never be an answer to this problem. I've had an exhibit score in the 90's after removing some of the "redundant" philatelic info, then drop back to the 80's with the judge telling me that I need to include more philatelic info to "demonstrate knowledge." The only thing I can say, to myself and others, is keep on hanging in there and don't give up!!

# **ANOTHER RESPONSE TO QUESTIONS FROM LAST MONTH:** What software do you use in preparing your exhibits? Are you happy with it? What are the good points? Bad points?

(**From Pat Stilwell-Walker**) I use Microsoft Publisher. I've been exhibiting long enough that I started with an electric typewriter and graduated up through a couple of word processor programs. I changed to use Publisher about 10 years ago now! At the time the really tech heavy computer users were recommending the various desktop publishing programs like Aldus PageMaker, that were incredibly complicated – we wanted something fairly simple. Publisher filled the bill.

Yes, I'm very happy with it. The major benefit is that text (in boxes) can be moved and shaped at will any place on the page. I compose directly into the computer for the most part and my first draft invariably doesn't allow enough room for everything I want. I use a text box to represent my cover (you can size it exactly with a formatting tool) to show how much space is needed and then move (and split) my text to fit where it needs

to go. Just "drag and drop" or resize; go from a horizontal paragraph to a column by changing the shape/size of the text box.

Personally I have NEVER been able to move objects and text boxes at will in Word – the program insists on "anchoring" things where I don't want them! I gave up trying to understand how to get around this when I moved to Publisher.

I use tables for lists (such as rate calculations) and they are easy too. The text and table formatting are identical to Word, so if you are familiar with that, Publisher is easy to learn. You have the standard bold, italic formatting, text centering and justification, font choices and sizes, etc.

Publisher has a function for inserting "pictures" – from files that lets you import scans you want to include – no need to size them when scanning, you can do that in Publisher by sizing the frame of the object!!

It has a "style" function that lets you define how your headings look; which is easy to replicate on new pages. If you change your mind you can define a new "style" and impose it on existing pages! This is one of the minor drawbacks – to do this you have to "touch" each box you want to reformat – there is no way to select multiples across pages and convert them at a single operation. It's a fast operation, though – about 5 years ago, I converted a 10 frame exhibit is a few hours; probably could do it faster today!

Publisher has a feature called "layout guides" which lets you make (on the computer screen only) your page look like a quadrille page – allowing you to design and place things in proportion. It also has alignment tools for centering, etc.

Your "work space" on the screen consists of a page in the center and space outside the page (your desk?); you can keep copies of objects and templates (frame lies for standard stamp sizes for example) sitting in this space and copy them onto your pages as needed. You can also replicate all the objects on a page when inserting a new page.

Typically I keep a chapter of my exhibit in a file so the exhibit consists of multiple files. It also helps me locate pages when I need to change them. I used to do it by date but I tended to lose various revisions.

The one drawback is that each box of text is a single "story" and spell checking is typically done one story at a time. You can spell check the entire document, by asking for "all stories", but you cannot spell check just the text boxes on a single page. I've trained myself to spell check a box after I type it, but I don't always remember....

I've taught several friends to use Publisher for their exhibits – as you can tell I'm a fan!

**REPORT FROM MAUREEN LYNCH:** Just had to share my triumph at Aerophilately - my 7 frame exhibit on 200 years of air post seen through balloon mail took a Vermeil award! First time our material has gotten higher than silver; quite an accomplishment, considering the rest of the exhibits (and their caliber) at the show, and the fact that balloon mail (except for siege material) tends to be regarded in lower esteem than other types of air mail.

I noted I was the only woman exhibitor at this event, so was glad I participated. Spouse Chris was to come, but we were unable to secure child care for our 2 kids in our absence, so he stayed home and told me to go "do my thing!" The judges were all very helpful, and everyone there was supportive. Happily, the American Air Mail Society has always been very encouraging and supportive of me and other new members (I suspect because they need younger and new members!). I've never encountered anything I could perceive as intimidation. I do know my subject, and buy/sell this material on the side, so that likely makes a difference. But, I was delighted with our showing at Bellefonte, and encourage anyone with any interest in airmail to take a look at it -- there's a lot of fun to be had here!

As time and budget allows, I plan to rework the exhibit a bit, and pursue the concept that this category of air mail is structured differently from other types -- here, the technology and application (use) of the balloon determine the collecting genres within balloon post, rather than destination (rates and routes). Thus, modified criteria might be in order when judging. But this is an idea which has a long way to go to be developed.

And yes, I wore my WE button while down there!
