When exhibit pages are prepared on a computer, we tend to accept the default computer settings. For most programs, the default is black text. Some exhibitors, however, have been able to use text colors to a great advantage. Two examples are Dickson Preston's Off-Color U.S. 3¢ Commemoratives 1893-1945 (title page shown in Figure 1) and Tony Dewey's The 3¢ Connecticut Tercentenary Issue of 1935 And Its First Days (title page shown in Figure 2).

Both of these exhibits show stamps of a single color and by using an ink that matches the color of the stamp, the title pages stand out. (Tony's whole exhibit — which uses this colored ink in places throughout the exhibit — can be seen at aape.org/DeweyExhibit.asp.)

The color of the ink we use in our pages is not the only way in which we shape the range of colors used in

The 3¢ Connecticut Tercentenary Issue of 1935 And Its First Days

PURPOSE & SCOPE: This is a multi-frame "Traditional" First Day exhibit of the 3¢ Connecticut Tercentenary stamp of 1935 (Scott #772). First Day covers shown include those postmarked on its official date of issue, April 26, 1935, as well as its first day of general release (i.e. 2nd day covers), mainly from Washington, D.C. The imperforate version of the design, one of four designs included in the 1936 TIPEX souvenir sheet, is NOT included in this exhibit.

TREATMENT: Following the Traditional format, this exhibit starts with a study of the stamp. Photo essays (ex Sol Glass) are followed by large and small die proofs and a color trial, then a study of the plates and plate varieties. Alas, EFOs for this issue are virtually unknown.

The main section on the First Day covers begins with the circular sent by the Third Assistant Postmaster General to postmasters. The FDCs are arranged by the main design element, starting with those depicting the Charter Oak tree. First cachets are indicated by the symbol • Sets of cacheted covers are kept together and shown at the end of this subsection. Unofficial FDCs follow in the next subsection arranged first by towns in Connecticut in alphabetical order, then by towns in other states, ships and RPOs.

Note that covers showing special services (e.g. airmail, registered, special delivery, etc.), auxiliary markings, foreign destinations, etc. are interspersed in the FDC section. These will be highlighted with judicious use of bold text.

The exhibit concludes with commercial uses. Examples shown are restricted to contemporaneous uses.

Key and important items are highlighted with a "rich lilac" border (as suggested for the stamp color by FDR).

Cachets and eachet varieties not listed in Planty/Mellone will be identified by the symbol * in the exhibit, as will be unofficial towns not listed by Colby.

our exhibit. The color of the paper, as well as the way in which we make borders to highlight significant pieces, all compose the family of colors we use in our exhibit.




Figure 3: (At right) Section of Kathy's exhibit page with graph.

There is another area in which we shape the colors used for our exhibit. In the last issue of WE Expressions, presented column information about using graphs in exhibits. Figure 3 is a page from Kathy Johnson's exhibit. Senegal: French Colonial Africa 1914-1940. She has included a graph on the page. Unlike the graphs shown in last

rest of the page; it appears jarring when viewed with the stamps on the same page. What can we do? Are we stuck with the Microsoft default colors if we want to make graphs? The simple answer is no.

The user controls the colors in a graph. As an example, Figure 5 shows fictitious data about distribution of mail types in a pie chart with colors that Microsoft Excel suggests in the default colors. By double clicking each pie slice, you get to a secondary menu that allows you to choose the color

hard. Some of us are gifted and have an artistic eye that makes it easy to know what colors work well together. Others of us have difficulties in this area. And if we are

focusing on multicolor stamps, it can be even harder for us. Fortunately, there is an online palette tool we can use: www.degraeve.com/color-palette.

If we insert the website location of an image file, the site returns colors to match the image. I went to eBay, found an image of one of Kathy's stamps, uploaded it

You control every aspect of your exhibit. Remember Kathy's graph (Figure 4)? I redid it with the suggested




Figure 8: Kathy's graph with new colors.




Figure 5: Graph with default Microsoft colors.




Figure 6: Graph with customized colors.
